# Public Space at Horizons at Plainfield

## (The History of Tepper's Basement)

Completion of the public space in the lower level of Horizons at Plainfield remains high on the list of administrative priorities. A feverish first phase of improvements to the space included the installation of two bathrooms and new plumbing, the subdivision of interior space into office and meeting rooms, rough electrical work, and the acquisition of HVAC systems and furniture. Advancing the project to its final phase and public use, the City will retain a construction manager to complete remaining items necessary to obtain a Certificate of Occupancy. Planned for public purposes, the completed space will also include the use of the courtyard, thereby expanding the footprint and creative use of the City's public space.

Turning the wheels of government has been especially challenging in the habitation and fit-out of the Tepper's dedicated public space project. Deeded to the City in December 2005, funding for the improvement of the space was received as a federal earmark in January 2001, 5 years prior to the Robison-Briggs Administration taking office. The City's application for funding included several options for the use of the funds. All of the options re-

quired a public use and included a police substation, a new senior citizens' center, municipal offices and the relocation of the City's Bilingual Day Care Center. In 2006, upon taking office, the Robison-Briggs Administration discovered that a decision on the space had not been reached by the former Administration and the grant was due to expire in 2007, without an option for an extension.

Dedicating a use for the public space was further compromised by the discovery of water filtration and improper drainage that caused ponding and flooding in the basement area deeded to

the City. The City sought to negotiate the application of the funds elsewhere on the redevelopment site, hoping to maximize the use of the earmarked funds. The grant source however, restricted the application of the funds to the footprint of the building proper, and agreed to allow the City to apply the funds to leverage the construction of a new building on the remaining infill site on Somerset Street. The redevelopment schedule, including board approvals and construction, however, would have exceeded the grant period. The City opted to apply the funds to fit-out the basement in phases.



## National Hispanic Heritage Month

In September 1968, Congress authorized President Lyndon B. Johnson to proclaim National Hispanic Heritage Week, which was observed during the week that included Sept. 15 and Sept. 16. The observance was expanded in 1988 by Congress to a month-long celebration (Sept. 15 – Oct. 15), effective the following year. America celebrates the culture and traditions of those who trace their roots to Spain, Mexico and the Spanish-speaking nations of Central America, South America and the Caribbean.

Sept. 15 was chosen as the starting point for the celebration because it is the anniversary of independence of five Latin American countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on Sept. 16 and Sept. 18, respectively.



## An Initiative Designed to Address and Enhance Youth Related Issues

The Plainfield Department of Public Affairs and Safety is collaborating with the Department of Public Works and Urban Development in an initiative designed to address and enhance youth related issues. A systems approach designed to engage city services, school programs, non-profit organizations, faith based entities, and the business community will be explored and marshaled under the direction of Assistant Director of Economic Development, Jacques Howard.

The Police Division is being refocused toward placing additional resources in the Juvenile Aid Unit along with research and development of a "best practices" approach/procedure in relating to the challenges of crime prevention, interdiction, and abatement. Those best practices will emphasize active partnerships with the aforementioned organizations along with proactive measures that will identify children designated to be "at risk".

Dedication of resources within the police division will include manpower and equipment solely dedicated to improving the service provided by the division to the community. The Police Division is excited and encouraged by this new direction that will channel new and existing resources into a unified program identifying solutions that will positively impact the youth in our community.

The Plainfield Police Division as one component of this strategic plan will identify the necessary resources within the law enforcement community to help combat the negative forces that impact our youth.

## Recent Planning Board & Zoning Board Approvals Development In Progress.....

In March 2010, the Zoning Board of Adjustment approved the conversion of a two-story, and a one-story vacant building at the **corner of Leland Avenue and South Avenue** for the Friends of Central Jersey Arts Charter School which will accommodate up to 405 students.

In April 2010, the Zoning Board of Adjustment approved the Barack Obama Green Charter High School as part of the Boys and Girls Club child care center at **530 West Seventh Street**. The charter school will accommodate up to 120 students.

In April 2010, the Zoning Board of Adjustment approved construction of a three-story building and a 31-space parking lot for 3,900 square feet of retail use and 8 residential apartments **437-457 West Front Street**. As of June 2010, we have been working with the Applicant on the remaining outstanding resolution conditions required before the issuance

of building permits.

In May 2010, the Zoning Board of Adjustment approved a use variance for a proposed development of 25 residential apartment units at **916-926 South Avenue**. The Applicant has now applied for site plan approval and it is expected that the Board will hear this application in the next few months.

Planning Board meetings are held on the First and Third Thursday of each month, unless otherwise noted, and will start at 8:00 p.m. in the Plainfield City Hall Library, 515 Watchung Avenue.

The Zoning Board meets on the first Wednesday of each month, unless otherwise noted, and will start at 7:00 pm. in the Plainfield City Hall Library, 515 Watchung Avenue.

## 3 Year Road Improvement Program Projects



The Robinson-Briggs Administration established a proactive construction schedule in an effort to address resident concerns regarding roadway conditions. Various construction projects were completed this year as part of the City's 3 Year Road Improvement Construction program .

### Contract #1:

This project consisted of the removal and replacement of curbing, and driveways as needed, and the milling and resurfacing of the following roadways:

- Myrtle Avenue: From Rock Avenue to Albert Street
- Compton Avenue: From Myrtle Avenue to West Front Street

### Contract #2:

This construction contract consisted of the removal and replacement of curbing, and driveways as needed, and the reconstruction and / or milling and resurfacing of the roadways. All roads that were reconstructed were done so utilizing the "Pulverization, Stabilization, & Overlay" (P.S.O.) method. The process generally consisted of the pulverization, recycling, and grading of the original road materials with the application of asphalt emulsions to strengthen the roadway base materials prior to the final overlay. Utilization of the P.S.O. process to reconstruct the roadways saved construction time, materials, and costs as compared to conventional "full depth" reconstruction methods.

- Brookside Place: From Geraud Avenue to the "Dead

End"

- Woodbine Avenue: From Kensington Avenue to Stillford Avenue
- Thornton Avenue: From Park Avenue to Hillside Avenue
- Richmond Street: From East Front Street to Watchung Avenue
- Aletta Avenue: From Plainfield Avenue to Field Avenue

### Contract #3:

This project used the same method as Contract #2 for the construction of the following streets:

- Moffett Avenue: From Park Avenue to Florence Avenue
- Florence Avenue: From Moffett Avenue to South End Parkway
- Florence Avenue (Extension of project from South End Parkway to Belleview Avenue
- Whittingham Terrace: From Salem Road to Cul-de-Sac:
- Highland Avenue: From Hillside Avenue to Woodland Avenue
- Remington Avenue: From Kenyon Avenue to Lakeview Terrace
- Central Street: From South Avenue to Woodland Avenue
- Oak Lane: From Watchung Avenue to Sleepy Hollow Road

### *Did you know...*

The City of Plainfield, Mayor Sharon Robinson-Briggs & the Division of Parks & Recreation continues to apply for funds from various grants offered by the County of Union, State of New Jersey and Federal Government.

The funds received are used for the following:

- New construction or rehabilitation of recreation facilities
- Assistance to local non-profit organizations
- Purchase of equipment and supplies for the Division of Recreation & local non-profit programs

Since our last report, the Division of Parks & Recreation was awarded funding by the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders - Community Development Block Grant Program & the Kids Recreation Trust Fund.

The Kids Recreation Trust Fund awarded \$104,045 which was applied to the following:

- \$4,045 for scholarships to cover registration fees that were used by some of the local non-profit agencies
- \$15,000 for equipment purchased for the Division of Parks & Recreation
- \$85,000 for renovations at Bryant School Playground.

The Community Development Block Grant Program awarded \$219,254. which was applied to the following:

- \$100,000 was used for renovations at Bryant School Playground
- \$9,654 for this year's Jr. Playground Monitor Program and \$9,600 for next year's program
- \$100,000 to upgrade Maple Crest Basketball Courts



# North Avenue Redevelopment Area

The City of Plainfield has been working with Landmark Developers, the designated developer of the North Avenue Redevelopment Area, to construct a five story, mixed-use residential and retail building which will contain 148 residential units and 12,000 square feet of retail area on a 2.5 acre tract located on West Second Street between Park Avenue and Madison Avenue.



The West Second Street Commons site is located across from the Union County Park-Madison Complex and the Plainfield Train Station; it is a key redevelopment parcel and once complete it will serve as a catalyst to future residential and commercial development in downtown Plainfield.

The residential component of the building will have 68 one-bedroom, and 80 two-bedroom units and there will be on-site parking for 132 vehicles. Among the commercial uses the building will contain a branch office of the PNC Bank. The proposal also includes the relocation and rehabilitation of the historic circa 1855 Titsworth-Sutphen house, which is located on the far western corner of the site.

West Second Street Commons is one of seven Landmark Developers projects in the immediate area in varying stages of approval. When completed, these developments could transform downtown Plainfield with the rehabilitation/creation of over 80,000 square feet of retail, restaurant and office development, the introduction of a new 10,000 square feet of nightclub/entertainment use, and 190 residential units. The developer has physically commenced work on three of the sites, and will be submitting an application for funding for the West Second Street Commons project. All of these developments advance the goals and objectives of the recently adopted Plainfield Master Plan which calls for a Transit Village type of mixed use development (office/retail/residential) within a quarter mile of the Downtown Train Station.

On September 16, 2010, the Planning Board heard the final testimony on the West Second Street Commons application, and granted final approval with conditions to the development. Some of the conditions imposed include the installation of a new streetscape along West Second Street, a concerted effort by the developer and the city to obtain the use of the Union County Improvement Authority parking deck on the Park-Madison site during off peak hours, the relocation of the historic Titsworth-Sutphen house, and construction consistent with LEED (Leadership in Energy Efficient Design) standards. Much design, documentation and permit work must still be accomplished, but this major undertaking may become the catalyst for a downtown Plainfield transformation. Downtown Plainfield residents may soon be able to hear the train whistle, rush out of their apartments, grab a bagel and be off to work!

## Snow Tips

During snow fall, the City of Plainfield's Division of Public Works will clear the City streets as soon as possible. Typically, the DPW begins plowing streets when snow has accumulated 1" - 3".

Removing snow and ice from the streets, roads, sidewalks and driveways is a job we need to do together. By working together, we can clear the snow and ice for safe access to roads, businesses and residential properties.

Please remember:

- Do not park vehicles on posted emergency routes or No Parking streets.
- Please use off street parking when possible.
- Unoccupied vehicles parked or idling in violation of the City Ordinance shall be deemed a nuisance and menace to the safe and proper operation of traffic.

**If the above are not adhered to, you may be subject to fines and towing of your vehicle.**



### Additional Tips

- Plow driveways to the curb only after the street is plowed.
- Shovel snow to the right of the driveway.
- Do not shovel snow into the driving lanes on the street.
- Wear reflective/bright clothing when shoveling snow.
- It is the owner's responsibility to clear the sidewalk of their property/establishment within 24 hours of a snow storm.

Following the above tips enables the Division of Public Works to provide you with the highest quality of service during severe weather events.

### Shoveling Tips



- *If your home or business is next to a cross walk, please shovel a wide opening for pedestrians or children utilizing the walk.*
- *If you are going to be out of town, please be sure someone will clear your sidewalk.*
- *Please help by digging out fire hydrants and catch basins. They are there for your protection!*



### Storm Water Regulations are still in effect.

The state has mandated all municipalities remove loose debris from the curb area within 7 days or require residents to bag leaves and yard waste. In an effort to prevent our residents from mandatory bagging of leaves and yard waste, we ask all residents to please place yard waste and leaves at the curb the night before their scheduled pick-up date. Failure to comply, may result in fines to the City and homeowners.
